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Medical Respiratory at First Hill

Who we serve

We are a 30-bed acute inpatient nursing care unit serving the nursing care needs of a general medical patient. Our unit is comprised of 10 private rooms and 20 semi-private rooms. All rooms are equipped identically for the care of an acutely ill medical patient.

Common diagnosis include asthma, COPD, pneumonia, DVT, GIB, sepsis, CHF, Cellulitis, Pancreatitis, as well as pre-liver transplant candidates needing work-up. We also provide supportive care for our patients with failure to thrive, those needing palliative care, and those requiring pain or symptom management.

General Medical at First Hill

We are a 30-bed medical unit that also cares for overflow oncology, nephrology, and surgical patients. We work with everything! Including, but not limited to: Diabetes, Sepsis, Cellulitis/abscess/wounds, Liver Cirrhosis, Alcohol withdrawal, Substance Use Disorder, Pancreatitis, FTT (failure to thrive), GIB (gastrointestinal bleed), SBO (small bowel obstruction), Altered mental status, UTI, COPD and Pneumonia, and Dementia and Delirium.

General Surgical at First Hill

Who we serve

We are a 29-bed unit with the population of 85% post-op and 15% medical patients. We see a variety of surgical cases, head to toe procedures, with exceptions of: Brain, Cardiac, GYN, GU, and Podiatry. If your passion is post-op management, this would be the unit you would like to be.

Our team is known for Teamwork, Collegiality and Critical Thinking

Our unit across the Swedish system is known for its teamwork, collegiality, and critical thinking skills. We manage post-op patients from the simplest procedure to the high acuity patients, such as head-and-neck surgery, neck dissection, and new trach. Gynecology Oncology/Surgery at First Hill

Who we serve: We are a 29 bed unit that is a true mix of both medical and surgical patients. Our patient population consists of but not limited to:

- **GYN Oncology Patients** Ovarian, cervical, endometrial, vulvar cancers. New diagnosis or women who have a GYN oncology diagnosis with an acute medical need (SBO, intractable pain, nausea, etc). Chemotherapy given 1-2 times/week. Palliative care and comfort care.
- **GYN Surgical Patients** hysterectomy, myomectomy, tumor de-bulking, ostomy placement and take down, D&C, mastectomy, DIEP breast reconstruction
- Post IR/Cath Lab- kidney and liver biopsy, uterine artery embolization, angiogram, IVC filter placement or removal
- Medical/Surgical Overflow- appendectomy, cholecystectomy, bowel obstruction, hernia repair, diverticulitis, etc

What we are known for: Teamwork, Complexity, and Women's Health

Our unit is known for its teamwork, complex patients, and our focus on women's health. We believe that the best patient care we can give comes from not only our compassion, but also from the collaboration between all members of the care team (nursing staff, NACs, providers, PT/OT, etc). The mix of medical, surgical, and oncology patients creates a great learning environment for new nurses and provides continuous learning for our experienced RNs. While our surgical patients have a short length of stay (0-2 days), our oncology patients are often here for longer periods or may be readmitted throughout their treatment allowing our team to build relationships with our patients and their families. - Oncology patients: we take care of some patients with solid tumors such as breast, lung, testicular, prostate cancers, and sarcomas
- Medical patients: we see patients with a wide variety of medical conditions such as diabetes, kidney and liver issues, alcohol withdrawals, wounds, tracheostomy, chest tubes, central lines etc..
- Staffing Mix: Day shift RNs generally care for 3-4 patients with a NAC working up to 7 patients, evening shift RNs- 4 patients, evening Shift NAC- 8 patients, night RN's 4-5 patients, night Shift NAC 10-12 patients

Orthopedics at First Hill

Who we serve

The Orthopedic Institute is a state-of-the-art facility on the south end of the First Hill Campus that draws patients from multiple states for specialized Orthopedic care. We are a department with two nursing units. Each unit has 28 spacious private rooms with an overhead lift, computer, and VS monitor. The units are designed to have what you need close to the bedside as well as a healing atmosphere. Our primary specialty is Orthopedics however we also care for overflow medical/surgical patients.

Our patient population consists of but not limited to

• Elective orthopedic surgery: total joint replacement, spine, upper and lower extremity

- Tumor resection: bone tumors with allograft and flap procedures
- Peri-acetabular osteotomy: complex pelvic surgery for patients with hip dysplasia
- Unplanned Ortho admissions: fractures, osteomyelitis, wound care, etc.
- Neuro: small population of patients who need a VP shunt, Chiari osteotomy
- Medical/Surgical: overflow patients with a variety of med/surg diagnosis including podiatry

What are we known for? Being supportive to new staff and teamwork!

Our unit is proud of the support and dedication we give to new staff to help them be successful. Nephrology/Urology/Transplant at First Hill

Who we serve:

We are a 30-bed unit that is a true mix of both medical and surgical patients. We have 2 negative airflow rooms and 4 rooms with ceiling lifts. Our patient population consists of but not limited to:

- **Dialysis patients**: Both hemo and peritoneal dialysis including Hepatorenal syndrome patients. Hemodialysis is done by our dialysis department, but peritoneal dialysis is done by 11 East nurses.
- Vascular patients: Fistula/graft placements, complications of these accesses, fem pop bypasses, endarterectomies, and amputations.
- Transplant patients: Kidney (both living donor and cadaveric), liver, and pancreas
- Urology patients: Removal of kidney stones, cystectomies, prostatectomies, urinary diversions, and nephrectomies
- Bariatric surgery patients: Gastric bypass and sleeve.
- Medical/Surgical overflow patients: abdominal surgeries, whipples, TB, and shingles, etc.

We believe that the best patient care we can give comes from not only our compassion, but also our teamwork approach that respects and collaborates together with both the medical and nursing staff. Acute Rehabilitation at Cherry Hill

Who we serve:

The ARU is a 36-bed unit with 10 ceiling lift rooms and majority of the patients are non-traumatic neuro medical-surgical patients (spinal cord injury, brain injury). The program is accredited CARF (Commissions on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities). Patients must 18 years or older, be able to participate in intense therapy (3 hours of therapy daily), rehab nursing, and have medical needs requiring physical medicine rehabilitation providers (physiatry). Other patient medical diagnosis may include:

- Brain/spine cancer, transverse myelitis, Guillain-Barre, epilepsy
- Other medical/surgical including lower limb amputation, post hip fracture Dialysis: hemodialysis is provided by the dialysis nurses; peritoneal dialysis provided by the 3 East neuro-epilepsy nurses

What we are known for: Interdisciplinary Care and Neuro Rehabilitation

The ARU is a destination inpatient rehabilitation unit in the greater Seattle, the only rehab unit within Swedish. We are known for patient-family centered care and neuroscience rehabilitation. Our team strives to help patients regain their highest level of independence possible while minimizing impairments. Continuous quality improvement and patient safety initiatives are led by the unit Shared Leadership council along with campus Shared Leadership councils.

Growth Opportunities

- New graduate cohort is a 12-week training program, you are partnered with preceptors and the clinical education team. After the , you will be trained to float to the 5E neuro-epilepsy unit.
- Shared Leadership Committee is an interdisciplinary staff lead council focused on quality improvement, evidencebased practice integration, and leadership growth.
- Unit Champions participate in campus-system committees focused on innovation (EPIC, healthcare practice) and preventable hospital acquired patient harm like infections (CAUTI, CLABSI), falls, and pressure injury (HAPI).

Neuroscience/Neurosurgery/ Epilepsy at Cherry Hill

Who we serve:

We are a 36-bed unit that cares for very high acuity neuro patients. We have 8 rooms that are equipped to monitor long-term video EEG patients for epilepsy and 6 rooms with ceiling lifts. Our patient population consists of but not limited to:

• **Neurosurgery**: These patients are s/p spine and brain surgery such as lumbar fusions, tumor resections, vascular malformations, pituitary resections and lumbar drains.

- **Epilepsy**: These patients check-in on Mondays, are weaned off of their anti-epileptic meds (AEDs), and monitored for seizures to occur.
- Stroke: We are a comprehensive stroke center that cares for high acuity stroke patients
- Muscular disorders: Multiple sclerosis, guillain barre, generalize weakness

What we are known for: Teamwork and Complexity

Across the Swedish system, our unit is known for teamwork, support, and critically complex and high acuity patient populations. It is a fast-paced unit that relies on strong teamwork to care for our often confused and critical patient population. It takes a truly compassionate nurse to love neuro and our staff are extremely caring. Whether it's jumping in to respond to a seizure or helping with bed alarms, we are there for each other. Our preceptors love training new staff, and if you have a question or need support and education, both medical and nursing staff are happy to help. The complexity of our patient population also helps develop critical thinking skills.

Medical Surgical at Issaquah

Who we serve

The Med/surg is a 35-bed unit that cares for adult surgical patients and medical overflow. We care for 80% postoperative surgical care and about 20% medical overflow. Our surgical care includes general surgery, orthopedic, bariatric, spine, gyn, oncology and other assorted categories.

What we are known for

We are a 175-bed community hospital located in the city Issaquah with very few subspecialty floors. We are located approx. 30 miles east of downtown Seattle. The advantage of our campus is that you get to experience a wide variety of post-operative patient conditions. We are known for our positive culture and excellent teamwork. Our residents are typically very successful and stay with us for years. We have a very fast paced floor in that you can start out with four patients, discharge them, and have four more due to the OR schedule. If you enjoy this type of pace you will enjoy this role. Continuous quality improvement and patient safety initiatives are led by the unit Shared Leadership committee along with campus Shared Leadership committees.

The resident will develop an initial nursing foundation, critical thinking, teamwork, and leadership skills. Due to the pace of the unit, your time management skills are well developed. Typically, nurses move on to subspecialty fellowships after their med surg skills are honed.

Staffing Mix

Day shift generally cares for 4-5 patients and night shift cares for 5-6 patients with NACs/Nurse Techs partnered with the assignment.



Medical Specialty at Issaquah

Who we serve

We are a 14-bed adult unit that is a mix of both medical and behavioral health patients. We have 1 negative airflow room and all rooms have ceiling lifts. We also have 2 high risk rooms for patients experiencing acute psychosis. Our patient population consists of but not limited to:

- **Medical patients**: Most common diagnoses include cellulitis, sepsis, pneumonia, GI bleeding, and small bowel obstructions. MSU also cares for end of life/hospice patients.
- **Psychiatric patients:** Most common diagnoses include schizophrenia and bipolar disorder. These patients are often on an Involuntary Treatment Act hold; and MSU facilitates longer term placement to inpatient psychiatric facilities in King County.

What we are known for: Teamwork and Collaboration

Our unit is known for its teamwork and multidisciplinary collaboration. We prioritize high quality, patient centered care and we accomplish this through strong teamwork. Our nursing staff works closely with hospitalists, psychiatrists, and social workers to develop each patient's individualized plan of care. We communicate regularly with multiple Swedish emergency departments and inpatient psychiatric units in King County to facilitate prompt treatment and placement of patients experiencing acute psychosis. Our nursing staff also participates in process improvement efforts for the campus through pilot studies that address quality measures

Growth opportunities

- New graduate cohort: 12-week training program where you will work with RN preceptors and the clinical education team that will help prepare you to work on the unit.
- Shared leadership: Nurses on the unit who are interested in process improvement can engage in unit-based committees, campus-based committees, or serve as unit champions for various nursing quality indicators.

Staffing Mix

Both day and night shift RN's generally care for 4-5 patients with 1 NAC on the floor. The charge nurse may have up to 2 patients. Our psychiatric patients often have 1:1 care by Patient Safety Attendants (sitters) in addition to the care provided by our RN's and NAC's.



General Medical Oncology at Issaquah

Who we serve

We are a 36-bed unit that is a mix of both medical and oncology patients. We have 2 negative airflow rooms and all rooms with ceiling lifts. Our patient population consists of but not limited to:

- Dialysis patients: Hemodialysis is done by our dialysis department.
- **Oncology patients**: Patients with complication from cancer and chemo/radiation therapy patients.
- Medical/Surgical overflow patients: General medical and mild general surgical patients, such as appendectomy, cholecystectomy, and skin I&D.

What we are known for: Teamwork and Quality

Behavioral Health at Ballard

Who we serve

Our specialized staff includes board-certified physicians, nurses, social workers, and other professionals who are experienced in treating various behavioral health problems with compassion and respect. We partner with patients to develop treatment plans, which promote stability, maximize daily functioning, enhance personal and environmental safety, and mobilize community support. When patients leave the hospital, we collaborate with them to ensure they can access appropriate resources to continue their journey toward wellness.

Swedish has an inpatient psychiatric unit located at Swedish Ballard that features 22 beds and quiet rooms to help promote mindfulness and self-centering. Our services offer a variety of inpatient groups including cognitive behavior therapy (CBT), art therapy, nutrition, pharmacology, spirituality, pet therapy, among others.

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Caregiver Growth Opportunities

- New Graduate Nurse Program: A 12-week training program where you will work with two preceptors and the clinical education team who will help prepare you to work on the unit.

We also have two full-time psychiatrists, social workers, a utilization review nurse, admissions coordinator, an independent court evaluator, a hospital unit coordinator, and a certified nursing assistant around the clock patients.



Behavioral Health at Edmonds

Who we serve

We are a 25-bed inpatient unit with 6 low stimulation acute care beds. Our patients either have a primary psychotic or affective disorder along with co-occurring medical and or substance use disorders. We provide a structured and safe therapeutic milieu with individualized treatment planning and group therapy to foster recovery from mental health symptoms. Our patient population consists of:

- Voluntary patients: Voluntarily admission to behavioral health unit. Right to request discharge.
- Involuntary (ITA) patients: Assessed to be a danger to self, to others, or gravely disabled due to psychiatric illness and are unwilling to seek voluntary psychiatric hospitalization. RCW 71.05

What we are known for: Teamwork

We provide holistic, recovery focused care for our patients, their families and our community. Our nursing staff follows the primary care model along with team nursing. We have a large interdisciplinary team of providers, social workers, occupational / recreational therapists and nursing staff to care for and support the recovery process for our patients. Surgical Telemetry at Cherry Hill

Who we serve

We are a 36-bed unit, all single occupancy rooms, that is a mix of medical and surgical patients. Most of our patients are on telemetry monitoring for their cardiac rhythm. We have 4 negative airflow rooms and 2 rooms with ceiling lifts. Our patient population consists of but not limited to:

- **Open Heart Surgery (OHS):** We are the step-down unit from the Cardiac ICU and manage all post-operative CABG, valve, and AAA repair patients. Many of our patients have chest tubes, drains, and external pacemaker wires.
- **Cardiac arrythmias**: We manage patients who are receiving medical or surgical interventions for their cardiac arrythmia including IV medications, MAZE, ablations, and pacemakers.
- Heart Failure: Patients with fluid volume overload requiring medications to support the heart functionality as well as well IV diureses
- NSTEMI: Patients with active chest pain require medication or surgical intervention
- Left Ventricular Assist Device (LVAD): All patients requiring and who have a LVAD
- Trans-Aortic Valve Replacement (TAVR)TAVR / Mitral Clip: Aortic and mitral valve repairs that require a lower level of surgical intervention than OHS
- Pulmonary Embolism (PE) / Deep Vein Thrombosis (DVT): Patients who require advances anticoagulation therapies for PE and DVT
- Medical / Surgical overflow patients

What we are known for: Teamwork, Complexity, High Intensity

Swedish Cherry Hill performs the most OHS cases of any hospital in the Pacific NW with over 1,200 surgeries annually. Our nurses work closely with the surgical team who are supportive and ready to teach and explain. In addition to the complex cardiac surgical patients our advanced cardiac support team has won High Performing Hospital for Treatment of Heart Failure and made significant positive impacts in the lives of our patients. We are a collaborative and professional community of high expertise caregivers.

Neuro Telemetry at Cherry Hill

Who we serve

- **Cardiac patients:** 3E serves a multitude of cardiac based diagnoses including arrythmias needing pacer or ICD placements, STEMI or NSTEMI needing angiograms. We do several congestive heart failure interventions including diuresis and cardiac drug infusions.
- **Stroke patients**: CH is the comprehensive stroke center for the Swedish healthcare system. We get patient's 24hr post thrombolytic (TPA) and procedural interventions.
- **Spinal surgery**: pre/post laminectomy, discectomy, and fusion.
- Brain surgery: pre/post craniotomy/craniectomy, tumor resections, hemorrhage evacuations
- **Rare disorders**: including Moya Moya, Guillain-Barre syndrome, Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease and other autoimmune diseases and neurological disorders.

Staffing Mix

Full time is three 12 hour shifts per week. We work in a team nursing model, 2 RNs are paired with an NAC. 7am-11:30pm RNs have a 4:1 ratio, night shift may go up to 5 patients after 11:30pm. Extra resources include an unassigned charge nurse, a resource nurse, a CH STAT RN that rounds on high acuity patients throughout the hospital.



Telemetry at First Hill

Who we serve:

We have two telemetry units at the First Hill campus, a 30-bed unit on 7SW and a 20-bed unit on 10SW. Both nursing units serve very similar patient populations, and the nursing units work closely together. The patients that we will see will mainly be medical patients that need telemetry monitoring. We are also a stroke certified nursing unit and are recognized by the American Heart Association as a certified stroke center.

We are unique from the medical floors as our unit monitors heart rhythms and we have the ability to administer intra-venous (IV) anti-arrhythmic and other IV medications such as diltiazem, amiodarone, dopamine, dobutamine, heparin, and nitroglycerin.

What we are known for: Teamwork, Family, Skill, higher level of care

Nurses and other caregivers will state that working on the telemetry unit is like working with family. Our team of charge nurses set the tone on the unit and help keep the unit engaged and help coordinate care. Our unit turnover is lower than average across the system because our team likes to work together. We do a modified self-schedule where the RNs take ownership of balancing a schedule.

As we are a telemetry unit, the RNs need to have a higher skill set than the medical RN. We are trained at interpreting heart rhythms and are required to hold our advanced cardiac life support (ACLS) certificate which you will attain 6 months after starting. We are also a certified stroke center and need to hold our stroke certificate (NIHSS).

Growth opportunities:

- New graduate cohort: 12-week training program where you will work with 1-2 preceptors and the clinical education team that will help prepare you to work on the unit.
- Education track to the ICU: If your goal is to work in the ICU, working on a telemetry unit is a great way to learn to manage both your time and develop the skills needed to start in the ICU. We work closely with our ICU team and help develop the RNs who wish to go into the ICU.

Both day shift and night shift at a maximum 4:1 ratio with nursing assistants at 8:1 during the day and flexible during the night. One dedicated charge nurse on each floor without a patient assignment and as census increases on 7SW, a resource nurse is available for support.



Telemetry/Progressive Care Unit at Edmonds

Who we serve:

We are a 24-bed telemetry unit. Our patient population consists of but not limited to:

- Neurological patient: Stroke, TIA and acute encephalopathy
- Cardiac patients: Post PCI, CHF, acute arrhythmias and R/O MI
- Multi organ failure patients: Sepsis, liver-kidney failure and electrolyte derangement
- Respiratory patients: pneumonia, ARDS and COVID.

Our telemetry floor is fast-paced, varied and dynamic. It is a great environment for new nurses wanting to establish themselves in an ever-changing, nurturing environment. There is encouragement to continue opportunity for academic and professional growth
